

2023 **USDA REDL&G & REVOLVING LOAN FUNDS REPORT**





Iowa's rural utility partners continue to lead the nation in leveraging the USDA Rural Economic Development Loan & Grant (REDL&G) program. In 2023, IADG had another record year by authoring \$41 million of successful REDL&G awards for its members and partners.

Addressing the economic development needs of rural lowa requires a multifaceted approach. IADG firmly believes that a crucial element of the equation lies in consistent investment in local businesses, communities, and rural areas. The REDL&G program and 76 operating revolving loan funds (RLFs) serve as invaluable, locally controlled and flexible financing tools with the potential for significant impact in rural regions. In fact, today's high interest rate environment makes these programs more important than ever.

This report spotlights the outcomes and trends resulting from the ongoing administration of the RLFs operated by Iowa's rural utilities. It is intended to demonstrate the program's effectiveness and serve as an inspirational resource for other utilities, projects, and communities. We hope these impacts will also demonstrate how effective this program is for Iowa and Rural America to Federal Legislators and USDA Program Administrators.

For over thirty years, IADG has been privileged to support our utility partners in their REDL&G applications and RLF administration. On behalf of the IADG Board of Directors and staff, we express our deep appreciation and acknowledge the continuous efforts of our sponsoring utilities in utilizing these programs. Their commitment serves as a catalyst for business and community development.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

REDL&G Program Funds

- In 2023, IADG's members secured over \$41
 million in funding through the REDL&G
 program, to support economic growth.
- This funding resulted in the generation of \$111.3 million in new capital investment and the creation and retention of 747 jobs.
- Since the establishment of the program, IADG's members have received a total of 451 REDL&G awards, amounting to over \$239.5 million in funding.
- Through the utilization of REDL&G, IADG's members have made a significant impact on lowa, with cumulative awards contributing to \$1.28 billion in new investment in rural communities and the creation or retention of 22,446 jobs.

Revolving Loan Funds

The rural utility-sponsored REDL&G program grants create, then enhance locally controlled RLFs. IADG members also build RLFS by utilizing USDA's Intermediary Relending Program. Here are the combined highlights of these RLF fund impacts.


- A total of 76 lowa rural utility-operated RLFs have been established. This includes all of IADG's member electric cooperatives as well as a large number of municipal electric and independent telecommunications companies.
- The combined value of these RLFs, which includes USDA funding and local matching funds from the utilities, amounts to \$84 million.
- Utilizing these revolving funds, the RLFs have in turn made 1,264 loans totaling \$123M.
- These projects have spurred \$902.5M of capital investment and created and retained 17,296 jobs.



LOANS OVERVIEW

USDA Rural Economic Development Loan Program (REDL)

USDA program designed to spur job creation in rural areas. An intermediary (eligible Rural Utilities Service (RUS) borrower) applies for USDA loan on behalf of the project or "ultimate recipient of funds."



USDA 0% Loan

Eligible entities: For-profit, non-profit, government, or school district.

- Intermediary guarantees a USDA loan of up to \$2 million or 80% of project costs on behalf of the ultimate recipient.
- USDA loans funds to intermediary who then immediately loans funds to ultimate recipient.
- Terms of loan: 0% interest; 10-year term; up to 2-year deferral, payments amortized over 8 years.
- Ultimate recipient makes loan repayments back to intermediary who then repays USDA immediately.


USDA RURAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT PROGRAM (REDG)

USDA program designed to spur job creation in rural areas. An "intermediary" (eligible Rural Utilities Service (RUS) borrower) applies for USDA grant on behalf of the project or "ultimate recipient of fund."

Initial USDA Grant


Eligible entities: Nonprofit, local government, or school district.


- Intermediary receives grant up to \$300,000 or 80% of project costs
- Intermediary matches USDA grant by 20% and deposits funds in its revolving loan fund (RLF).
- Funds loaned from the intermediary's RLF to the project.
- Terms of loan: 0% interest; 10 years; up to 2 year deferral, payments amortized over 8 years.



Revolving Loan Fund

- Loan repayments back to intermediary are placed in RLF.
- Intermediary can make subsequent loans to other projects from its RLF.
- Revolved loan funds have less federal restrictions.
 Access to RLF loans do not require USDA oversight.
 Eligible entities:
 For-profit, non-profit, government, or school district.
- Terms and interest rate set locally by intermediary.






2023 PROJECT SPOTLIGHTS

CLARKSVILLE SKILLED NURSING & REHABILITION CENTER

Clarksville Skilled Nursing & Rehabilitation Center, a



42-patient facility established in 1975, is making significant facility upgrades. The renovation includes a new roof, an upgraded HVAC system, and interior enhancements, alongside extensions to the parking area, courtyard, and sidewalks. These improvements aim to enhance the experience for residents, staff, and visitors. The project is expected to begin in mid-2024.

Butler County REC secured a loan through the USDA REDL&G program to support this project.



PROMISE COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

Promise Community Health Center (PCHC) in Sioux Center, IA, has completed a \$3.2



million construction project, allowing them to increase capacity and better integrate patient services. The project includes a new 10,000 sq. ft., two-story expansion of their existing healthcare facility. The first floor includes behavioral health therapy rooms, administrative offices, exam rooms, and space for IT and maintenance. The second floor features patient meeting spaces, conference and education rooms, and a call center. The renovation also incorporates green and energy-efficient strategies.



North West REC supported this project with a USDA REDL&G program grant. Premier Communications also contributed a loan from their RLF.

SHELL BUILDING IN SPENCER

The Iowa Lakes Corridor Future Fund and partners are constructing a 30,000 sq. ft. shell building in



Spencer to accommodate a new or existing business. The building, located in the Spencer Technical Park South, will feature a steel support system, expandable design, and gravel floor to accommodate varying needs. It will be equipped with one overhead door, three passage doors, and the potential for customization as needed.

Iowa Lakes Electric Cooperative, Spencer Municipal Utilities and Corn Belt Power Cooperative were significant partners with both technical and financial support.



MONROE COUNTY HOSPITAL

Monroe County Hospital is currently undergoing a multifaceted




upgrade to its facilities. This includes adding a 685 sq. ft. MRI scan room to house a permanent MRI machine, renovating the Radiology Department and Acute-Care wing, updating isolation rooms, and enhancing infrastructure. These enhancements will improve patient services and staff retention and enable them to continue to serve as a community health hub. Construction started in 2024 with an estimated 12-month timeline.

Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative and Northeast Power Cooperative made significant contributions to this project, each securing a loan and grant through the USDA REDL&G program.


